'The Hestercombe Experience: the Rediscovery of an 18th Century Garden and Park'

Philip White is the founder and Chief Executive Officer of the Hestercombe Gardens Trust, not far from Taunton in Somerset. Thirty years ago when Philip was working for the Somerset Wildlife Trust, he took a walk in a hidden valley engulfed by trees and it became clear to him that here was buried a designed 18th century landscape that had been allowed to run wild and overgrown. Some research showed that it was created by the artist and polymath Copplestone Warre Bampfylde (1720-91) whose family seat was Hestercombe House. Bampfylde was well known to the Edgcumbe family and paintings by him of

the gardens and park are among some of the best known. Hestercombe is now an acclaimed and very popular tourist destination.



'The Mount Edgcumbe Country Park in its Historical Context'

Kate Feluś is a garden historian and historic landscape consultant. She is the author of *The Secret Life of the Georgian Garden (2016)*. Sir Roy Strong said of this book 'here for the first time we have a lively evocation of what the Georgians used their gardens for, a subject as valid and interesting as it is to know how the rooms in their houses functioned'. She is the lead author of the unpublished report on the parkland at Mount Edgcumbe (*Mount Edgcumbe Parkland Plan*, 3 vols, 2016).
