I have decided to write an overarching update each month, that will be sent to the 6 Parishes and 1 Town Council that sits within the Rame Peninsula & St Germans division. I hope that this will give an overall picture of the work being done across the division and will help inform Parish & Town Councillors.

Cornwall Council and around the Peninsula-

There were very few Council meetings during August, much of the Council is quiet during this month. Returning to meetings in September, our Full Council meeting was postponed by a day due to the official mourning period for our late Queen.

I was pleased to be able to join with several of our Parishes in their official proclamations of the accession of King Charles III. These were solemn and moving events that I felt honoured to be invited too. I also signed the book of condolence at New County Hall on behalf of the Rame Peninsula and St Germans division.

At our Full Council meeting of the 21st September, I was proud to be able to move a motion on the cost of living crisis, which included sensible ways in which our Cornwall Council can proactively work with communities over this winter to help alleviate the impact of the crisis on residents that we represent. I was really pleased to see members from all political parties speaking so eloquently on this matter, there is a real understanding of the pressure this places on residents in Cornwall. After a small bit of amending the motion passed with only one Councillor abstaining. In conjunction with this I have set up an open letter on the cost of living crisis, which can be found at www.cornwallcostoflivingcrisis.co.uk (The text of the motion is on the next page).

I was absolutely delighted to be re-elected unanimously as the Cornish co-chair of the Mount Edgcumbe Joint Committee. This is an interesting period for the park, where under careful management, it has become cost neutral. So, instead of costing both Councils thousands of £ per annum, this fabulous asset covers its own costs - while still having the back up of the Councils and being owned by the people of Plymouth & Cornwall. It is an excellent example of public ownership. 🙄

to achieve)	This is against a backdrop of inflation at over 10%. The average wage in Cornwall is already roughly £5000 less than the national average, house prices are roughly 14 times as high as wages and 18% of children live in relative low-income families. Cornwall already has families living in fuel poverty, this current crisis will exacerbate that.
	With a further rise of the cap anticipated in January it is clear that a significant number of people, families and businesses in the duchy will soon find it impossible to pay for their energy bills as well as all their other outgoings.
	Some academics are predicting more than half of UK households will be in fuel poverty - defined as having to spend over 10% of net income on fuel - by the end of the year.
