Why are we making these changes?

Strategy:

Cornwall Council's adopted Resource and Waste Strategy

We need to manage our resources more effectively and reduce our carbon footprint

Council priority – A Thriving, sustainable Cornwall:

Key Intervention – To deliver the strategic programme to transform the household recycling and rubbish collection service



New Legislation:

Statutory Duty - Environment Act 2021 brought in the requirement to collect food waste separately

What are the benefits?

We will manage our resources more effectively; use less, recycle more and have as little rubbish as possible




- We will recycle more by collecting food waste separately

Managing our resources - What's in the black bag?


Over 50% of what's currently in a black bag can be recycled



Anaerobic Digestion

We expect, once fully rolled out, the new food waste collection service will generate in the region of 20,000 tonnes of food waste per year for anaerobic digestion, which would have otherwise gone in the 'black bag' waste.

- Anaerobic Digestion (AD) processes food waste to release methane which is cleaned and produces electricity.
- Processed food waste is used as a land fertiliser.
- •It is a stable, efficient way to recycle food waste, maximising the benefits from treating it.



Delivering the new waste collection service (1)

282,000 households will receive the new service. ~ 50,000 households per stage

- Five geographical delivery areas
- Stage 1 starts with bin delivery from **October** 2023
- New collections for the Stage 1 area starting January 2024

Delivering the new waste collection service (4)

Bin delivery

Over 840,000 containers will be delivered as part of the service change, this includes bins, caddies and protective sacks.

- Most households will receive a 180-litre wheeled bin
- Some households will receive a 180-litre protective sack or bespoke bins if communal

 A 180-litre containers will generally hold 3 to 4 black bags








Delivering the new waste collection service (5)

Outdoor and kitchen food waste caddies





The outdoor food waste caddy will be emptied weekly

Homes will receive a trial pack of compostable kitchen caddy liners





The programme 'Stages' in more detail




Timeline for a Stage

What do I need to know?

How will my rubbish and recycling collections change?

- · New food waste collections every week
- · Black bag rubbish will be collected every fortnight
- · Recycling will continue to be collected every fortnight with no changes

When will the new service start?

The new rubbish and recycling collection services will be rolled out across Cornwall area by area in five stages with the first area starting in winter 2023.

How will I know when the changes start in my area?

We will contact each household with information about their new collection service before it is introduced in their area.

What new equipment will each household get?

- One 180-litre wheelie bin OR a 180-litre protective sack for rubbish
- One 7-litre indoor food waste caddy for the kitchen

What do I need to know?

Will I get a wheelie bin or a sack?

Will I get a wheelie bin or a sack?

If the property or access to the property is not suitable for a wheelie bin, a protective sack will be provided instead.

We will be in touch with each household directly with more details before the new services are rolled out in their area.

Are the protective sacks seagull-proof?

Yes, the reusable, protective sacks are designed to prevent wildlife, including seagulls, from getting to your rubbish.

Can I use my current bin when the new collection service comes in?

No, we can will only collect rubbish from wheelie bins or protective sacks that we will provide you.

Will you collect my old bin?

We can collect your old bin and recycle it for you.

If you prefer, you can keep your old bin it and use it for something else but we won't be able to collect rubbish from your old bin once the new collection service starts.



How will we make it work together?

Service Change Comms and Engagement Process

We want to support residents and provide all the tools they need to start using the new service. Below show the process we will out in place that is focussed on those who need additional help or who aren't using the new service correctly.











At this stage, a bin tag/sticker which will advice 'no side waste', 'use your outdoor food caddy' and how to 'contact us' for help At stage 2, a leaflet offering advice and help will be given to provide assistance with using the new service Moving to stage 3, a visit to the property will take place to talk about how we can help and how the use the new service Stage 4 we would deliver a formal recorded letter to the property. Reminding of the impacts and their responsibilities of using the new service Due to continued non compliance,
Enforcement Team will review evidence with a view to issuing a 'Notice on Intent' to advise a fixed penalty notice will be issued. After 28 days, Final Notice Issued

STAGE 1 – Advice Letter/Bin Tag STAGE 2 – Advice letter/leaflet (recorded)

STAGE 3 – Visit (recorded)

STAGE 4 – Formal letter (recorded)

STAGE 5 - Enforcement
