Additional Police Report

I've attached the stats and newsletter for this month. There has been a big reduction in reported violence overall, which is positive. Stalking and harassment offences all relate to parties known to each other, there are no stranger-related stalking incidents to be concerned about. Several of the public order incidents are linked, for example one incident has occurred but several individuals have been present so multiple crimes have been recorded (one for each victim).

There has been a big increase in criminal damage. Whilst some of this is domestic related, the vast majority relates to the 'sprees' we have had of late and have happened over the course of a couple of days. I have asked response to get out and about and believe they have identified some potential youth offenders for the graffiti offences. These individuals are known to us and will be dealt with robustly so we should now see a reduction in this type of crime and hopefully get some justice for the victims.

There has been a rise in drug possession offences which, to be honest, I am glad to see as we know this is happening and it means we are at least catching up with some of the offenders. We can only record a drug possession offence if officers are aware of it, which basically means if an offence has been recorded then an offender has been caught. All information from members of the public is gratefully received, but this is recorded as intelligence unless it is happening at the time and we can catch up with those involved immediately.

I have also created a tasking for response teams which has been shared to all Sergeants. I have asked that, whenever possible, officers patrol around Torpoint town, paying particular attention to The Lawn and Harvey Street. I have added Wellington Street and St James' Park to this list as I know some residents have been experiencing ASB in this area- we put a Facebook post out regarding cherry knocking a couple weeks ago to try and raise awareness of this sort of behaviour. The uptake from the response teams has been really positive, they are coming to Torpoint whenever they get the chance and are keeping me updated. I'll continue to monitor this and will raise it in my upcoming meeting with our Inspector and ASB Co-ordinator so we can take a joint approach to the issues.

I hope this makes sense, please let me know if you have any questions.

- nausea and vomiting
- hallucinations and paranoia
- poor co-ordination and vision
- an inability to communicate clearly
- memory loss and blackouts

It's a terrible thing to do to anyone. That's why doing it in any form is a criminal offence, and it could have serious consequences for you if you do it, with sentences up to and including life imprisonment. (Section 18 - Offences against the Person Act 1861 - Wounding with intent to do grievous bodily harm).

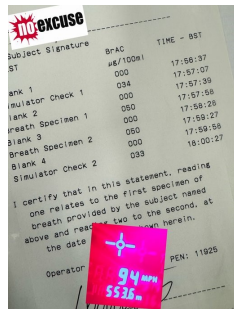


This Fiesta was stopped near #Bodmin driver found to be a provisional licence holder, not insured

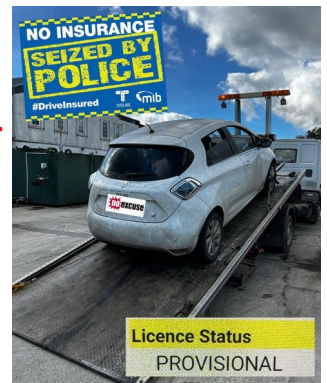


and tested positive for cocaine on a roadside test - he has been arrested, the vehicle seized and prohibited from use on the roads until repaired

A30 #Bodmin - Mercedes stopped for excess speed - driver found to be unlicensed, uninsured and drink driving - in custody blowing 50 - the limit being 35 - charged to court for all offences #NoExcuse #Fatal5



#Launceston - Renault stopped and found to be uninsured and the driver held a provisional licence only and was not supervised - vehicle seized and driver reported to court #NoExcuse



#Redruth - Audi stopped with a failed MOT - both rear tyres below legal limit, lighting defects and steering defects



identified - driver reported and vehicle prohibited from further use until repaired and retested #NoExcuse

Yes it's a minor offence but one easily evidenced / enforced.

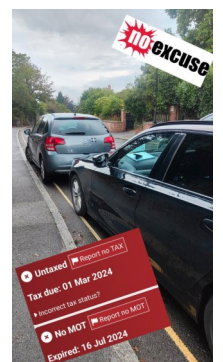
Using a vehicle on a road showing a red light to the front is an offence. If you have them fitted to your vehicle please remove. Ticket issued. 7163

#TRURO - when you are using your personal vehicle for deliveries daily with no documents, your luck will run out eventually. Vehicle seized for no insurance and driver reported for all offences #NoExcuse



Remember if you're coming to Cornwall that we have a lot of hills and you need a good handbrake . Second vehicle today that has had to be recovered due to manageable defects, resulting in collisions.
